This 14-day cruisetour has so many historic locations on its itinerary, it may as well have John Philip Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever" as its soundtrack. Begin with a land tour featuring two days in Washington, D.C., where the White House and George Washington's Mount Vernon Estate on the Potomac River are just a couple of the many must-see highlights. Visit the Jamestown Settlement and, as a special treat, enjoy dinner served in a Williamsburg Colonial tavern. Continue to Richmond, home to St. John's Episcopal Church, where Patrick Henry famously said, "Give me liberty, or give me death!" Enjoy a scenic drive on the way to Gettysburg National Military Park. Sightsee in Philadelphia, home to Independence Hall and the Liberty Bell, before continuing to New York. Here, you'll board the *Caribbean Princess*<sup>®</sup> for a 7-day cruise to visit even more historic sites in Newport, Boston and Bar Harbor. Spend the last three days of your cruise exploring the various, scenic port cities of the Canadian Maritimes. End your cruise in New York, and fly back to Seattle.

**Washington, D.C.** – Here’s where you’ll find a wealth of American history. Chosen by George Washington as the permanent capital of the United States in 1791, the city is literally packed with monuments, museums, memorials and historic landmarks. From Capitol Hill and the “Federal Triangle” to Arlington and the National Mall, you can experience the culture and heritage of this powerful city everywhere you turn.

**Williamsburg, VA** – This city’s meticulously restored historic area is known as Colonial Williamsburg, and it’s a veritable living-history museum portraying Richmond’s first capital as it looked in the 1770’s. Roaming citizens don powdered wigs and are transported by horse-drawn carriages, taverns serve Colonial fare, and tourists who don’t mind their p’s and q’s just might find themselves locked up in the town’s stocks.

**Richmond, VA** – The state’s capital since 1780, Richmond’s stately homes, monuments, battlefields, museums, St. John’s Church and Confederate White House are essential to see, whether you’re a Civil War buff or not. This metropolis has plenty of modern fine arts facilities and a botanical garden, too.

**Charlottesville, VA** – A quintessential college town (Univ. of VA), Charlottesville is also known for its scenic countryside, occasional celebrity sightings and as the home of Thomas Jefferson’s Monticello.

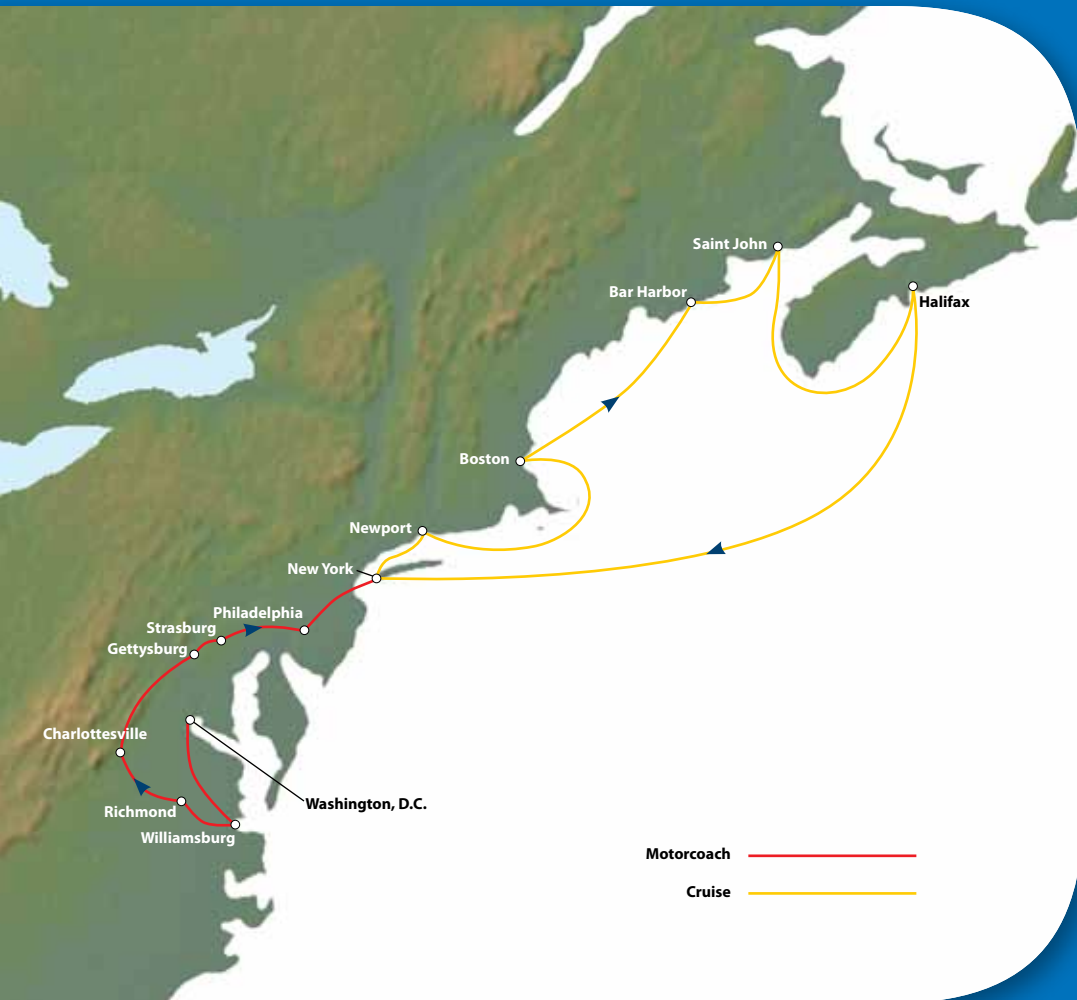
**Gettysburg, PA** – Visit the revered Civil War battlegrounds that are also the setting of President Abraham Lincoln’s most famous address. Nearly two million people a year visit this site – the largest battlefield shrine in America with more than 1,000 monuments and cannons.

**Newport, RI** – Thank the 19th-century industrialists, railroad tycoons, coal magnates, et al for the highlight of this town, their summer “cottages” – a chain of grandiose mansions still in use.

**Boston, MA** – Affectionately referred to as “Beantown,” Boston is one of the oldest and wealthiest cities in America. Popular attractions include Boston Common, the Freedom Trail, Bunker Hill Monument, Paul Revere’s House and the USS Constitution, also known as “Old Ironsides,” among many others.

**Bar Harbor, ME** – With everything from distinguished architecture, shopping and fine-dining to T-shirt vendors, ice-cream shops and souvenir stores, Bar Harbor has bounced back nicely since an accidental fire burned a large portion of the island in 1947. Check out the best water views in town at Agamont Park.

**Saint John, New Brunswick** – Depending on your outlook, the town of Saint John is either charming or a bit gritty. Either way, the setting is gorgeous. Impressive mansions built long ago by timber barons sport intricate woodcarvings inside and elaborate Victorian flourishes outside.



**Halifax, Nova Scotia** – Once a military outpost established by Col. Edward Cornwallis in 1749, Halifax has carved out a niche as the vital commercial and financial hub of the Maritimes. The city is also home to quite a few colleges and universities, as well as swanky restaurants and hotels.
